


NAMDEVCO'S ROLE

WHAT IS THE GAP CERTIFICATION SCHEME?



GAP Certification Scheme is the certification system related to fresh fruits and vegetables, to which a GAP Standard will be applied.

The focus is to improve the agricultural practices adopted by producers/producers groups.





On farm food safety programme that provides the agriculture industry the opportunity to supply and buy fruits, vegetables, and related products that are certified as being produced using Good Agricultural Practices (GAP).

(Adapted from USDA definition of GAP Certified)





MAJOR BENEFITS OF GAP CERTIFICATION



- Reduced economic risk
 - Cost of Food Borne Illnesses to farmers reputation, state provision of health care and consumers breakdown of trust.
- Improved opportunities for market access
 - major supermarket chains, school systems, restaurants, and other market outlets.
- Improved safety and quality
 - Identification of hazards and the application of good practices to improve.





STRUCTURE OF SCHEME







PLAYERS INTERACTION



- RB enacts and enforces food safety legislation
- NSB develops country specific GAP Standard
- SO adopts the GAP Standard
- The local CB is recognized by the SO
- CB certifies the producers according to:
 - National GAP Standard locally recognised
 - International Standards internationally recognised
- AB provides accreditation of the CB



SUPPORTING DECISIONS



- Will the GAP Scheme be voluntary or mandatory?
- What structure will be established to implement GAP?
- Who will be the scheme owner and the secretariat?
 - NAMDECO, MALF or both
- Who will be the certification body/bodies?
 - Governmental, NGO, Private, Single or Multiple



SUPPORTING DECISIONS




- Whether the certification body should be approved or accredited?

 - Steering, Technical and Certification
- How will the standard be implemented?
 - Single modules, Whole, Gradual, Phased or Tiered
- Should a certification mark or logo be developed?

RECOMMENDATIONS/ PROPOSALS




- The NGAPP should be transitionary, introduced as voluntary and progress to mandatory
 - Will the GAP Scheme be voluntary or mandatory?
- Based on NAMDEVCO's mandate and role it is best positioned to carry out the responsibilities of the SO
 - Who will be the scheme owner and the secretariat?
- A terms of reference was developed and relevant subject matter experts were identified
 - Constitution of multi-stakeholder committee to develop, implement and oversee?

CERTIIFCATION IMPLEMENTATION STRUCTURE




- NAMDEVCO is seeking Cabinet Approval for:

- No local CB accredited to the required ISO 17065, however, TTBS
 Certification Division is seeking accreditation
 - □ Who will be the certification body/bodies?
- TTBS & CARIRI among other local labs have the ability to carryout the required test Should be accredited to ISO 17025.


NEXT STEPS: Consumers & Commercial Buyers
